The FCS staff is looking to retire the the current truck for a new one.

FCS recently received a grant award from the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation to replace the current truck at the Community Center. The STK Foundation promotes strengthening and supporting communities and has a special interest in organizations and people who have less recourse to usual channels of resources, focusing on community-based initiatives.

Paula Paladino, Executive Director, states "We are so pleased to receive this very important grant award for a new truck from STK Foundation, as this is a critical need. Our 13 year old truck is fully depreciated and a truck is essential for our day to day operations." Sarah Lundin, Community Services Coordinator says "Our truck is used to pick up donated food from local grocery stores and the Good Shepherd Food Bank,



destined for our food pantry which serves an average of 444 individuals every month." During an average six months, FCS transports over 60,000 pounds of food from donations by local stores and the food bank to the plates of those in need.

Additionally, our thrift store utilizes the truck to pick up donated furniture as well as offer delivery of furniture to those in need, who have no other way of getting it home due to lack of personal transportation. Paladino adds "Having a safe and reliable truck means so much to our community and the services we offer to our neighbors. We are very grateful for this grant which helps us continue our vital mission here in Freeport and Pownal."

Freeze Out warming hearts



The 13th Annual Freeport Freeze Out event took place on February 18th. Our tagline is "Warm your heart" and our donors and volunteers truly did just that throughout Freeport from 10am to 6pm, with the goal of raising awareness of the critical need for services for the most vulnerable residents of Freeport and Pownal. They collected non-perishable food and personal care items, as well as financial gifts, during this event. Donation boxes were placed at a variety of businesses and organizations. Proceeds support vital programs for community residents, such as the food pantry, fuel assistance, and emergency services.



Volunteers were on the lawn of the First Parish Church Congregational, and in locations throughout downtown Freeport including Bow Street Market. Also, from 9am-2pm, we were at Shaw's Supermarket in Freeport for our "Stuff the

Bus" event supported by Shaw's Supermarket and the Freeport Rotary Club.

FCS Freeze Out collected approximately \$9,500 in donations and sponsorships and nearly 700 pounds of food. Over 175 volunteer hours were donated this year at the various locations. Thank you for making these events successful and it's because of the generosity of our donors, volunteers and supporters that we continue to be able to provide services to our neighbors.

Community needs assessment is released

Freeport Community Services (FCS), in conjunction with the Freeport Housing Trust (FHT) has released the results of the "Community Needs Assessment for Low-Moderate Income Population" that was conducted in 2016 for the towns of Freeport and Pownal by Planning Decisions Inc.

The Freeport Housing Trust (FHT) is a community-based nonprofit whose mission is to provide safe, decent and affordable housing opportunities for the lower and moderate-income households of Freeport. FHT owns 149 units of rental

housing, including 82 rental units in four family properties and 67 units of senior housing in three housing communities. FCS provides and coordinates essential direct services such as emergency food, fuel, and utility assistance. Together, the two organizations provide services to several thousand households in Freeport and Pownal.

The primary purpose of this report is to identify the unmet needs of the low-moderate income population in Freeport and Pownal, including those currently served and unserved by Freeport Community Services and Freeport Housing Trust. A second purpose is to provide an analysis of housing needs.

The findings in this report are organized around six themes that emerged during three focus groups conducted in March 2016 as well as interviews conducted with service providers, including school administrators, General Assistance, and local churches. The report is available at www.fcsmaine.org.

We invite the public to attend our annual **Community Night on Thursday, May 17th** from 6:30-8:30 pm at FCS for a discussion and to offer input and suggestions on the report.

the donating entities. When firewood is given, Steve is on the job, picking up the wood and delivering to local families. Steve has helped folks move to new residences, given rides back and forth to Portland for citizenship classes, driven people to the grocery store, the pharmacy and laundromat. Steve also drives people to and from FCS so they can volunteer with us. Always caring, Steve carries a step stool so no one will have a hard time getting into his truck – and he has attached sideboards to his truck to accommodate even the largest loads of donations. "Nothing bothers me, Steve says. If I can do it, I will."

There isn't a volunteer driving challenge that Steve hasn't accepted. Steve brings a deep-rooted Maine work ethic and a lifelong history of helping people to his FCS commitment. Before retiring, Steve realized his sickly neighbor had become unable to mow his large lawn. Every week, without fail, Steve mowed



nat lawn, exactly how he knew his neighbor liked it. Upon the man's death, steve continued to mow the lawn until the property was sold. "If someone eeds help. I want to help them." "I will help anybody." Steve said.

Another admirable quality is Steve's sense of humor and he's a great prankster. One day he walked into the office on crutches. After he had a good laugh at our reactions, we realized we'd been caught again by one of Steve's pranks. He is a friend to everyone, and a positive role model. At the age of 77, Steve has the heart of a hero and the spunk and ambition of a young man.

Steve is as humble as they come, shying away from any form of recognition and appreciation. Like each one of our FCS volunteers, Steve is a personal hero to those lives he's touched; he gives his whole heart and soul to his volunteer mission. The sheer amount of hours that he drives each week – easily 15 to 20 - qualifies him for legendary status. If you should see Steve out on the road, be sure to blink your lights and wave – for he always loves making a new friend – and we're certain you'd love to know him!
